

Happy Advent and Christmas, St. Christopher's!

Advent is that first season of the church's liturgical year that so often gets lost, over-looked because of the cultural-based-insanity that overtakes our world in the time between Thanksgiving and Christmas Day. Christmas trees and decorations have been up in the stores since the day after Halloween (if not before). All of us can get caught up (or perhaps fed up) with the push of the season. It seems to me that is one of the benefits of having this short Season of Advent - where we are reminded: to breathe deep, to reflect often (if only momentarily), to pray. To remember that there is something more important than that perfect gift or card...To remember that Jesus' birth that we prepare to celebrate is the center of this season, not us. that direction can help us put other things in perspective.

display. We are consumed as we consume. But the words of Fredrick Buechner remind us that the extraordinary thing that we and this season is about is about to celebrate, hasn't quite happened yet. And still there is something equally extraordinary although still and quiet that is happening here and now. Advent is that wonderful season of preparation and meditation that is in Buechner's words the name of that wonderful moment of expectation that we as a faith community honor each year.

When I first came to St. Christopher's, I shared that my favorite Advent tradition/memory is the fact that our son, Andrew, had decided at around age 6 that the Baby Jesus should not be placed in the family crèche set before Christmas Eve. We found out about his rather strong feelings on the issue when the Baby Jesus went missing, and Andrew remained silent as we questioned out loud where on earth Jesus could have gone. We went to the early evening church service that year, and while everyone else was busy getting things ready for dinner, Andrew slid off, retrieved the Baby Jesus, and placed Him with the other figures as he announced "Now Jesus can be born!" It was a tradition that long passed childhood and went into college and law school. I miss the ceremonial disappearance and celebratory placement of that little figurine. And I wonder if he will teach his own little daughter to do the same thing?

I share that story, because it never fails to remind me not to rush too quickly into the wonder that is Christmas. Nature, with its ever shortening days and cold weather seems to call us home, where there is light and warmth and quiet, to dwell in the mystery that is about to happen. It is often a mighty struggle to fight the onslaught of the world outside our doors at this time of year, but when we do, when we take the time to respond to the natural rhythm of the season, our lives are richer and our joy at Christmas that much greater.

My invitation to all of you, my sisters and brothers in Christ, this Advent season is to at least metaphorically remove the Christ Child from the center of things for the next few days and weeks, move with the rhythm of the seasons, draw yourselves in and find time to read or meditate or simply be, with the expectation of what is about to happen. And then on Christmas Eve, after we have all celebrated with great joy at the extraordinary event that has (finally) happened, place the babe in the manger and in your hearts.

Kids squealing with excitement, running around with brightly wrapped presents asking, "Is it for me?" Shreds of wrapping paper litter the floor and adults are smiling, enjoying a day free of stress... free from the problems they face on a daily basis.

You may be on a wall in a home, an apartment, a homeless shelter or perhaps in temporary housing. The family you see is one of the many families that Keystone's case managers have been working with throughout the year to strengthen and stabilize their lives. This family is able to experience the joy and blessings of Christmas because of the kindness and generosity of Gifts of Hope sponsors.

Although you probably cannot become a fly on the wall, you can make this scene a reality for a family in need this holiday season. By helping St. Christopher's with the families we sponsor, you can help change the way an entire family views this special time of year.

Keystone case managers have nominated families they feel would most benefit from this assistance. Through the generous support of sponsors, struggling families are given an opportunity to spend quality time together sharing memories and making new ones.

Our Gifts of Hope display, created by the youth and children, is in the Lower Narthex. There are ornaments with tags attached. The ornament is yours to keep - hoping that you will remember and pray for the recipient and their family. The tag gives information about a person and items on their wish list. Please take an ornament (or 2 or 3) and purchase an item for this person. Bring the gift (with the tag) to church **unwrapped** and place it in the box by Sunday, December 11th. Monetary gifts are always welcome- they should be placed in Marion's mailbox outside the main office or slipped under her office door. Good Morning. I am on your Vestry. Today I am offering the Pulse of the Parish. The purpose of this brief update is to keep you informed of the actions taken by the Vestry at their meeting on Monday, November 21st.

- The monthly financial report was reviewed. Budgeted income is below expectations due to the kitchen not being used by renters. Our budgeted expenses for the month and year are below budgeted amounts. Our financial situation remains as has been budgeted. As a reminder, we ask that if you have not yet started participating in the automatic withdrawal payment program, that you contact Ruth Thillen, our Parish Administrator, to begin participating in that program. It allows for more reliable cash flow.
- The Vestry learned that the LED lightbulbs have been ordered with installation hoped for before Christmas.
- The Vestry reviewed and approved the program budget prepared and recommended by the Finance Team. A letter detailing the 2017 program budget will be sent to the parish in early December
- The Vestry discussed status reports concerning Nominations for Vestry, the Silent Auction, and the Mardi Gras fundraiser.
- The Vestry is pleased to announce a caterer has been retained to handle all funeral luncheons which families choose to host in our Parish Hall. The caterer's name is

Kathy's Kitchen. They offer a wide range of meals, both hot and cold, at a reasonable cost.

- The Vestry is looking for volunteers to organize and participate in the Roseville Parade in June of 2017. Please contact either Mary Pendergrass, our Senior Warden, or Jeff Jensen, our Junior Warden if you would like to be lead or participate in this important local event.
- The Vestry would like to recognize the following people in our "Shout-outs" for the work they have recently done for our parish:

 - Everyone who worked on the Small Bites and the Silent Auction
 - The Flower Garden Team

Please be aware that the minutes of the November meeting will not be available to read online or in the library until after they have been approved at the Vestry's December meeting.
