There are three distinct areas for my article this month, and finding no way to tie them together in a nice poetic fashion, they are simply presented separately....

Worship is Important

Labor Day is September 4th, which marks, for many, the non-official end of summer. The great Minnesota get-together ends that day, as does our filled-to-over-flowing-parking-lot from all the Fairgoers who utilized our lot for their Park and Ride experience. A few parishioners commented that "Gee, wouldn't it be nice to see the parking lot this full for both services each Sunday?" I, of course, responded, "Yes it would!" This picks up on a theme many of my clergy colleagues and I have been discussing of late. We all have parishioners, and families, that tell us they love our church, our programs, our worship and music, and yet come, maybe, once a month. Their pledges are up to date, but their attendance is spotty. This is not just a St. Christopher's issue, or an ECMN issue, it is church-wide... and not just limited to The Episcopal Church.

An acquaintance of mine said to me recently, "We Episcopalians have made it too easy for people to skip Church! There's no sin or guilt in not showing up, so folks just skip without any repercussions!" I chuckled and moved the conversation in another direction. But his statement has stuck with me.

One of the most important reasons to participate in corporate worship is the gift of time we give ourselves to consciously remember God's loving presence in our lives. So often, we allow our busyness to take precedence over our attendance at worship. And in so doing, we start to equate worship with work: another thing we have to do. And so we skip that *gift*, because we equate it to something else on our calendar, something expendable.

We need to tell ourselves, and others, that worship is not work. Worship is actually a pause in our work: a time of refreshment and rejuvenation and joy and wonder. It is not a waste of time when we could have been responding to an email or reading the newspaper or running that next errand. By giving ourselves that gift of time to

remember God's love for us, we are also then continuing our work of becoming the love-oriented and love-centered people Jesus calls us to be as his followers.

Worship helps us be healthy. Without giving ourselves this gift of time, we all too easily, and often without realizing, slip into not being able to cope as well with issues in our lives, our relationships with people become harder and more challenging, and our focus becomes the transitory, instead of that which is important and should be the center of our focus.

Corporate worship is important. We support each other, and our true selves, when we celebrate with joy and imagination the deep and abiding love God has for us, and that we see in each other, as well as the stranger whom we help. Remember this Program Year that coming to St. Christopher's to worship isn't work, but is a healthy and soul-filling opportunity, giving us the wherewithal to do all of the work of our individual lives.

Start-Up Sunday: a/k/a "Mission, Ministry, and Mini-Bites"

Sunday, September 10th, following our last 9:30 Eucharist, we will have our Mission, Ministry, and Mini-Bites festival. Come and chat about all the great things St. Christopher's has done this past Program Year, and what the plans are for this new Program Year. This truly is a time of celebration and excitement about what was, and what will be! The following Sunday, the 17th, will mark our return to two Sunday Eucharistic services: at 8:00 and 10:30, with Formation opportunities between the services. If anyone, or any group, wants a table to "represent to the community," please call Ruth in the office, or speak with me, and we will make sure there is space available!

Our Sewer Line

There is no easy or nice way to say this, so: our sewer line is failing and needs to be replaced. Many will remember the recurrent problems with back-ups in our sewer system. We have had an extensive review of the system and there are many problems, which unfortunately begin underneath our lower narthex. The 4-inch cast iron pipe has a "belly" extending the entire length of the lower narthex. A "belly" is a depression making passage through the pipe challenging, as well as causing stress on the pipe leading to breaks in the pipe. We are told that this belly has a large amount of "standing water" resident within it.

When the line leaves the building, it takes a ninety-degree turn toward Hamline Avenue and continues under the grass to the newly-unearthed manhole cover near the door at the west end of the building ("the choir door"), and from there joins another line from our building, and goes on an angle out to the Hamline Avenue line. There are multiple issues on the outside line.

After the line leaves the building and turns sharply toward Hamline, there is another 20 foot long belly. Ten feet beyond that, there is a separation in the pipe. After the line passes the recently uncovered manhole cover, there are two more substantial bellies. We have been told the system is near collapsing. This failure of the sewer line system is due to nothing more than age, and therefore there is no possibility for insurance to cover any of the costs associated with replacement. Cast iron has a life span of approximately 50 years. Ours has lasted a lot longer than its expected serviceability.

The Vestry is waiting on the second bid for the replacement of the entire system: with work starting underneath the lower narthex and continuing out to Hamline Avenue. This is a complicated and extensive project: interior work including, but not limited to, concrete work, tile, carpet, shutting off of water and sewer, bringing in port-a-potties and water; and exterior, digging out a new line,

insulating it with sand and stone, covering it with dirt, new asphalt and parking stall striping. We are told the job should take 10 to 14 business days to complete. The cost of the project is substantial. The first bid received is \$225,000. The vestry is waiting on the second bid prior to making any decisions, although we recognize that the work can only be done and completed before the first frost or next spring after the possibility of frost has past.

To pay for this project the Vestry is looking at the following options: pay for it from our investments (which currently stand at \$390,000); and asking for donations from parishioners who have the capability in helping pay a portion of this project. No decisions have been made, except for the reality that this work has to be done prior to the system failing, which would be catastrophic to the operations and sustainability of St. Christopher's.

Your Vestry will keep you advised as more information is received.

The Vestry discussed this at our last meeting, and we wholeheartedly concur that the Silent Auction is a very important event in our church year, fostering much fellowship and creativity in our community, and raising important resources for our Mission Opportunities. In order to do this, we need volunteers to step up to do the work of running and administering the auction. Support and guidance will be provided.

As we seek new volunteers to step up for this year, the Vestry considered possible ways of making the Silent Auction event more streamlined and focused, so that it could be even simpler to administer for the new co-chairs.

In the past few years, donations of parties and social events have grown stronger and have generated more and more of the

proceeds that we use towards so many important mission opportunities. Our gift card and wine/beer raffles have also grown in popularity and revenue. One suggestion would be to possibly focus the Silent Auction offerings on parties and social events. Like last year, we would like to host a festive Saturday evening wine and appetizer bidding party, which will also include our popular gift card trees and wine/beer selection raffles.

Also please consider hosting a new social event this year - we encourage you to think creatively about offering fun and fellowship gatherings.

Community Dinner Mission Update

St. Christopher's monthly Community Dinner is a flourishing outreach and welcoming ministry for us. Each month, we welcome our neighbors to join us for food, community and conversation.

Around these tables, we connect and engage, strengthening the ties to our own surrounding community, and providing much more than simple nourishment.

Our Community Dinner team is an amazing group of collaborative and dedicated parishioners. Head cooks Vant and Maureen plan and prepare an array of wonderful meals.



Our mighty team of volunteer kitchen preparers, servers, table hosts, greeters, table setters and clean-up crew work together with scheduler Connie Hendrick to plan, prepare and serve the meal and clean up afterwards. Our 'Mary' table hosts join guests at each table to engage and connect directly with our guests. Deacon Janet is actively involved in this ministry, including her ongoing coordination with the Roseville school district to identify families and immigrants in need and connect them with our dinner program.

We welcome one and all, including families and quite a few elderly singles. Each month, we serve an average of around 35 guests hot, hearty meals (except for a few cold meals in the hot days of summer). Our Thanksgiving, Christmas and other holiday meals have served two or three times that amount. We also provide many second helpings and to-go meals, helping those in need to make ends meet as the end of the month nears. Based on Second Harvest Heartland counting and reporting guidelines, we maintain a detailed count each month of the meals served, plus the seconds and to-go boxes.

Many of our guests have joined us regularly since the beginning, yet we also see an increasing number of new attendees each month. We see relationships forming around the tables at each monthly gathering.

I have been a team volunteer since the dinners started, and I truly value the opportunity to be a part of this mission. I am heartened when I run into our guests at the grocery store or library, which happens on a regular basis. This clearly confirms that St. Christopher's is truly engaging with our neighbors in the community that surrounds us.
