Communion: Any guest who desires to receive Holy Communion may do so.

Baptism: The Sacrament of Baptism is normally only administered to infants, children, and adults who themselves (or whose parents) intend to become active participants in this local congregation. Traditional times for Baptism are: Easter Eve, Pentecost, St. Christopher's Feast (July 25), All Saints, and the first Sunday of Epiphany. Baptisms can be arranged for other Sundays by conversation with the Rector.

Burial: The liturgical service of the "burial of the dead" is available to members of any Christian denomination.

Marriage: The Sacrament of Christian Marriage must be arranged at least 90 days prior to the date, and requires at least three counseling sessions.

Membership: Those desiring to become communicant members of St. Christopher's should consult with the rector. An Inquirer's class is held as needed.

Minutes of the 2018 Annual Meeting

Sunday, January 20, 2019

Opening Prayers were led by Fr. Daniel Pearson.

Election of a Clerk: A motion was made by Becky Lucas and seconded by Scott Crow to approve Sue Triebenbach as the clerk to take the minutes of this Annual Meeting. The motion carried.

Vincent Anderson Awards:

Robert Williams & RJ Duff received this award for last year, 2018.

This year, 2019, the award goes to Mike Sirany for being the liaison between vestry & the Search committee, for being a lector, for his involvement with the Wednesday services and more.

St. Christopher's Award: Went to Karen & Bill Hanna for last year 2018.

This year, 2019, it goes to Darlene Cross for her involvement in the Choir, for helping with VBS -posters and decorations, for set up and organization for funerals, for being the finance clerk, for having been on the vestry in the past, for being involved in children's education, and many creative things around church.

Acknowledgement of Staff: The staff reports are in the Annual report. Fr. Pearson reported that the staff shows up which is important and makes working fun for Fr. Pearson. They are all delightful people. On the Vestry, he reported that each of them are great. There are three going out: Becky Lucas, Jan Fillmore, and Mike Sirany. They will be missed.

Approval of the Minutes of the 2018

Annual Meeting: A motion was made by Ann DePaolis-Jones to accept the previous year's minutes. There was a second. The motion carried.

Elections of new vestry members: Josh Kattelman, Erin Bowman, and Al Reedstrom were nominated to be new vestry members. A motion was made by Barb Hovey to approve these three as the next vestry members to serve a three year term. The motion was seconded. The motion carried.

Nominations of Wardens: Kathy Ackerman was nominated for the position of Junior Warden. A motion was made by Ella Snyder to approve her for this position. There was a second. The motion carried.

Capital Campaign Update: Scott Crow: This campaign begins today and has been approved by the vestry. It will be a three year campaign. Enthusiasm for this was found in the parish study that was done earlier. A steering committee is forming for this campaign. The goal is to raise \$300,000.00 which would be paid over a three year period. This is an outstanding time for this to happen. We have a miraculous gift of \$100,000.00, given in 2018, to lead the way. We will hear more about this in the late winter or early spring.

We need to elect our Sr. Warden: Joel Norton served as our Junior Warden for 2018. Mary Pendergrass moved that he be elected as the senior warden. There was a second. The motion carried.

Financial Report: Ruth Thillen reported that 99.5% of pledges were in by Dec 31, 2018. Thank you to all for this. We did not use our prior surplus funds. There was a shortfall due to lack of kitchen use and because of reductions to Fr. Toua's rent and the rent from the Chinese Daycare due to the lower enrollment they had. This can be seen in the annual report. Only 72% was spent in the Administration area because many items cost less than expected, and we have a surplus of \$25,392.00.

The 2019 Budget: See the written report. The expected income is \$444,672.00. There is a 2% raise for staff. There are funds for new books in library. There is an increase in the cost of utilities. We are leasing a new copier and saving money. We are not funding convention expenses. We have added expenses for costs of moving a new rector. Expected expenses are \$435,578.00 with a surplus of \$9,094.00.

Senior Warden's Report: Cindy Lee: We are on a journey with our search committee. We have furthered and advanced many ministries here. Thank you to Fr. Daniel for being here and being with us and being phenomenal in so many ways. Sunday Forums have been enlightening and energizing. We are grateful for his many gifts. Cindy also expressed thanks for Joel Norton who is a super committed and wise person. He brings a sense of wisdom and dedication in his leadership. She thanked the vestry again. There was a round of applause for Cindy.

Junior Warden's Report: Joel Norton seconded the thank-you to vestry and staff. All of the vestry and Cindy have been helpful. We have spent this past year preparing for a new rector. Joel mentioned the following highlights of the year: The work by the Discovery & Discernment committees. The survey questions and ideas that help define us. Joel suggested we look at the church website as the discernment work is all there. About financial stewardship, he reported we have enough money to cover a new full time rector. In the past, we were going down, but this year is different. In the buildings and grounds area, the grounds are looking great outside. On the inside, various groups have been cleaning and stocking the bathrooms. In the outreach programs area, Joel noted that the Thursday dinners have youth and all generations helping. About the giving garden, the Green Team harvested 700 pounds of produce which was brought to the Food Shelf. About the Search committee: he

mentioned the time they took reading resumes, interviewing, and put in many hours in progress. Joel gave a special thanks to Fr. Daniel Pearson.

The Rector's Report: Fr. Daniel had many good words for Cindy Lee, the outgoing Senior Warden. His report can be read in annual report. He suggested that we read this when we have insomnia.

The New Senior Warden's remarks: Stay tuned for announcements on the new rector search. We are being patient letting the search committee do their work. Pray for them daily, for discernment, unity, and stamina.

Other Business: There was a question of why haven't the solar panels been bringing in money for us? It is a long story, and we are working on it. The solar panels are working. Joel Norton is working with Sundial, the solar company, to resolve this issue. A new sub-array is going up on the flat roof. This is going on-line and is a part of the solution. The complicated loan payback wasn't working as expected with the way Excel pays us back. The solar panels are working in another way; we are widely known. Joel is taking calls and questions from many others. Another question was asked: Will a report be written about this? Yes, Joel is working on it, and it will be made available.

Further comments about the solar panels are noted: It is very cool to have the cross design within the solar panels. With the loan being repaid, now what the panels produce will go to the church. We are powered from above.

A motion to adjourn was made by Jeff Jensen and was seconded. The motion carried.

Rector's Annual Report

Thank you. These two small words have been said by me again, and again, and again in the past nine-plus months at St. Christopher's. They are not words sourced from a merely polite social response, but are most humbly and sincerely stated from the deepest depths of my heart and soul.

St. Christopher's has lived through a time of intentional reflection and discovery of where the Holy Spirit is leading, during the search for a new rector. Many times, the metaphor of spending time in "the wilderness" is applied to these experiences of seeking God's vision for our common life in Christian community. Kim and I have been overwhelmed by the loving kindness, encouragement, and support we have received by all of you.

One of the greatest gifts realized and received is the outstanding team of colleagues on staff at St. Christopher's. Chad,

Janet, Karla, Mary, Marion, and Ruth are among the most exceptional leaders in worship, music, children's and youth ministry, administration, and most importantly pastoral care that I have experienced in a faith community. They, along with elected leadership of wardens, vestry members, and ministry team leaders and members, contribute greatly to the missional ministries of this faith community in our neighborhoods. Energy, excitement, and above all, great joy in serving God have become the cornerstones of our shared life together in this adventure in faith.

Music Ministries

Music has long been a way for us to praise our Maker, to exult in the beauty that surrounds us, to proclaim our joy, our thanksgivings and our lamentations. It can be as grand as an Easter morning's triumphal anthem, or as simple as an unaccompanied melody. Our worship together at St. Christopher's is enlivened by the musical offerings prepared by our very own parish musicians. Most of them meet weekly throughout the program year and all of them work very diligently to present their very best. In 2019, they have all grown more accomplished in their musicality, nurtured one another on the journey and shared in the laughter and fellowship that naturally develops when a group of people work so closely together.

The **Parish Choir** rehearses and sings about forty weeks each year. That time commitment of four hours a week or more throughout those forty weeks is really only rivaled by the time commitment of the Vestry and wardens. These wonderful people faithfully lead the congregation in song, and also prepare weekly anthems and festival music for Easter and Christmas. Additionally, we offer an evensong and our beloved Lessons and Carols each year. This year's evensong never happened because of calendar conflicts, so we are looking forward to a 2020 evensong, followed by Afternoon Tea on **February 23 at 4:00**.

Our section leaders, AJ Lund, Katherine Johnson, Tom McNellis and Carolyn Nuelle support us with their amazing musicianship, and have become indispensable members of our choir community. These young people bring collective musical expertise, creativity and good humor as they enable us to tackle projects we otherwise might find too daunting; as well as to learn music more quickly and sound quite fantastic. Additionally, on any given Sunday, there might be a handful of singers absent for some reason, and those section leaders enable the volunteer singers to be absent without feeling guilty about abandoning their section.

If you attended our *Festival of Lessons and Carols* last month, you can testify to the amazing progress of the **Handbell Choir** over the last year. It takes quite some doing to go beyond just playing your two or three notes, to actually fitting them into the shape of each musical phrase as it is passed from person to person. Thus, each member of the group becomes critical to the performance of each piece. I couldn't be prouder of these folks, or more grateful for their hard work and beautiful playing.

The nature of musical groups is cyclical – one year you have too few chairs, the next you have too many. While it would be terrific to have enormous choirs, and the process of choosing music for bigger groups would be so much easier, I actually enjoy the creative challenge of finding interesting music for the participants we have. And it is my great pleasure to serve at St. Christopher's and work each week with the wonderful and wonderfully talented musicians of our parish. We are all so blessed by their gifts and their generous hearts.

In July we enjoyed a fun-filled week of VBS, "Mission to Mars." This was the second year that we opted to create our own music rather than use the "boxed" music that comes with the program. Many thanks to Jennifer Wright and Patrick Hunner for leading and choreographing the music. I am so very grateful for all of the volunteers that make VBS happen each year!

The annual hayride continues to be a big hit. Despite having a cold, rainy day, the tough Minnesotans who came had a wonderful time.

In the fall we dove into the new program year. Our Sunday School children continue to be combined in one classroom with ages 4-10. We began the year with a special unit on Saints, culminating in costumed saints in church on All Saints Sunday.

We added three new 4-year-olds to the Sunday School roster this fall, giving us a total of 11 children with an average Sunday attendance of 3-5. With our small numbers and wide age range, the challenge is to create programming that meets everyone's needs while remaining versatile enough to work with one child or six on any given Sunday. I am very grateful to the volunteers who keep our Sunday School program running smoothly: Kathy Ackerman, Jean Darnell, Carol Duff, Chris Huntley, and Cindy Lee.

I would like to offer a special thanks to Jane Suilman for her work on posters and displays and to Darlene Cross & Karen Hanna for their constant artistic support!

Nursery

We continue to offer nursery care during the 10:30 (and 9:30) liturgy on Sunday mornings. Youth Ministries

As we head in 2020, I am happy to report that the state of youth ministry at St. Christopher's remains strong. First and foremost, our youth are integral to our weekly liturgies -- sharing their time and talent as musicians, acolytes, and subdeacons. Other highlights this year include care packages to our graduated young adults, collection for Church of the Messiah at Pine Ridge and a joyous Christmas gathering. We are a community that puts great value in experiential, real-world

exploration -- especially when travel is involved. The greatest energy seems to be generated from summer road trips, such as our trip this past summer to Lower Sioux, Pine Ridge and Fort Berthold Reservations. At each we each able to directly touch, hear and see the beauty of other cultures. However, when combined with our learning from our Civil Rights pilgrimage in 2017, we also fully realize that we have a role in helping bring about racial justice in our communities.

The greatest area of concern continues to be our struggle to meet a "critical mass" at events. As high school students become involved in a variety of activities -- then graduate -- and fewer middle school students enter, maintaining enough young people to keep the "group" in "youth group" is a concern. This year we were unable to hold regular Wednesday night gatherings. It is my hope that we can continue to offer meaningful experiences on Sunday mornings during formation hour, keep our youth involved in liturgical ministries, and offer occasional fun activities throughout the year -- and summer -- for youth to join and build community.

During his past year, I was also able to see the church come together for the Capital Campaign Drive. I have to admit experiencing doubt and anxiety over the idea of attempting a fundraising event soon after our annual Stewardship Drive and in the middle of the rector transition. I was fortunate to have many leaders, staff and parishioners here at the church who had confidence in the power of the Holy Spirit and the ability of our faith community to come together with a common purpose. It has been humbling to see the congregation not only pledge to our goal, but go beyond it. It truly has been a humbling experience to be Sr. Warden and to realize the scope of what is happening here.

to know so many people here that I might not have any other way. The church is truly blessed with so many talented and caring people who are passionate about their work here. I want to thank everyone for all your passion, your love and your care for St. Christopher's and its parishioners. It has been a true blessing and honor to be your Sr. Warden. The Junior Warden's Report

Junior Wardens traditionally are responsible for the buildings and grounds of a church. And, in a church building of this size and age, that means a lot of issues crop up. A partial list of the issues in 2019 were:

- One State Fair bus crunched a corner of our concrete sidewalk at the lower entrance. That was paid for by the State Fair's insurance carrier.
- Our railings on the steps leading to the red door by the office were knocked over during State Fair. That was paid for by the State Fair's insurance carrier.
- A tree needed removal in the area between the kitchen door and the lower entrance. It was replaced with a maple tree from the Jim Brown memorial and dedicated to Peggy Barker.
- Randy's office needed refurbishing (that's ongoing, by the way).
- The door used by the choir needed replacement. It is now officially the Jim Richards door, as Jim's memorial fund was used to pay for that project.
- Our boilers needed some controls replaced.
- The nursery needed cleanup and refurbishing.
- Exterior lights on the west wall kept flopping over.

- Leaks, leaks, leaks. We always have a leak somewhere.
- Ice dams, sewer issues and other minor repairs at the Dellwood house.
- Work in the choir room to make it more accessible.
- The bathroom by the office was repainted.
- Minor plumbing issues – backed up toilets, running toilets, etc.

Now, that's not to say that I had a hand in all, or really any, of this. For example, the nursery project was a volunteer effort led by Marion Hunner, Jean Crow and Cheryl Warkentien.

Other projects were handled by what we jokingly referred to as the "Buildings and Grounds Ad Hoc Committee" composed of Mark Brilowski, Don Shiek, Bruce Warkentien, and our newest member, Jeff Jensen (the younger). They all were (and are) great about getting in and getting stuff done, often without the need to check in with me. (Which I sometimes found annoying, but can't sweat the small stuff!)

I want to really highlight Mark's involvement. What most people don't know is that he has put his license on the boilers for St. Christopher's and that puts his livelihood on the line for this church. (I've dealt with licensing folk at Minnesota's Department of Labor and Industry. They don't mess around.) That is commitment.

I was fortunate to not have to deal with a large-scale project like the sewer project of a couple of years ago. However, in looking ahead, I can see we need to perform significant work in a couple of areas:

1. All of our metal roofs should probably be inspected for corrosion and the possible need for replacement – either in whole or part. If they do need replacement, it won't be cheap.
2. The windows on north side of the church and possibly the west side (nursery, choir room, library, classrooms, office) are due for replacement. I believe

all of our other windows (not including the stained glass windows) have been replaced over the years. My guess is that will cost a chunk of change as well.

3. The Dellwood house is in bad shape. We have some ideas on how to deal with that issue on a long-term basis, which will be more broadly discussed in the coming year.

It just never ends.

As I prepare to move to the next phase of my volunteer life at St. Christopher's, to serve as your Senior Warden, I want to thank the Ad Hoc Committee for their tireless work, Joel for his leadership as we dealt with a lot of issues behind the scenes, Fr. Randy for his humor and grace.

Last, but definitely not least, "the boys" – Ross and Ben and a certain blue heeler named Lucky. They put up with me being gone a lot of nights at meetings. They put up with me being on the phone and being cranky after dealing with a thorny issue, and they just love me no matter what. I'm so fortunate that they have been gracious, patient (okay, not always, but on average, yes) and willing to give me up to the church for two years. Love you guys!

Library

Renewal of the Cap Hanson Memorial Library

Cap Hanson passed away in January 2018 and, during his 98 years on earth, he created a library at St. Christopher's of more than 1,300 books, and a legion of public school students who remembered his impact on them with memorial gifts to the church that totaled more than \$1,700. That could buy a lot of books, of course, but it occurred to parish members who heard about that Cap Hanson Memorial Fund at the annual meeting in 2019 that the money also could fund a renewal project of his beloved library.

In his last years, he and Kathy Curtis devoted a lot of energy to catalog the collection -- from xx to yy -- to a computerized database (LibraryThing.com), a terrific improvement. Yet more could be done. The incoming Senior Warden, Joel Norton, and our Parish Administrator, Ruth Thillen, were enthusiastic about honoring Cap in this way. "I think that Cap himself would be on board with making the Library appealing—I know he always felt it was under-used," Ruth replied via email. On Feb. 10, 2019, a new library committee gathered to create a vision: "Our goal is to make it a more warm and welcoming place for our parish members, and for others who use the library materials and the library room." They wrote an itemized request to the Finance Committee to fund new-to-us furniture, window treatment and paint.

Funding was approved by the Vestry and, with committee members skilled in the arts, theology, shopping, and painting, our Cap Hanson Library was renewed over the last year. The Library Committee is deeply grateful to the two dozen people who joined in the renewal efforts with ideas, hands, prayers, recipe contributions, puzzle

exchanges and book donations. After Fr. Randy Johnson joined our parish, he, too, joined an acquisition group meeting to offer his guidance. Ann Trapnell led a church cookbook project as a way to commemorate our renewal and, from the proceeds, fund more books and other improvements to the library.

Our library is used by those seeking spiritual guidance, parents of cello students, members seeking a place for conversation and those borrowing books. It's a place for you and all who come to St. Christopher's.

Thank you to everyone who planted, watered, weeded and harvested! Again in the June 2019 Roseville Parade, we gathered with Marion Hunner and the Vacation Bible School parents and kids, along with Fr. Randy and other parish members to walk

along with our Green Team-decorated trailer (borrowed from Father Tua) and hand out candy and postcards welcoming our neighbors to VBS and our parish.

In recent years, it's been neat to meet new people and tell them we're from St. Christopher's, the church you can see from Highway 36. "Oh," they typically reply, "with the solar panels and the cross! That's terrific." Now, because of the efforts of Senior Warden Joel Norton, other St. Christopher's leaders and everyone who contributed to the capital campaign, we can gain even more power from the sun with the additional solar panels on the flat part of the roof. These solar panels can only be spotted by drones—yet, we hope that everyone in the parish recognizes that through them, each of you participates in expressing God's love for creation.

All are welcome to join the Green Team, who meet at 7 p.m., on the second Wednesday of the month, in the Parish Hall (or sometimes, Stout's).

Endowment Fund Report

Our Endowment Fund is invested in the Pooled Investment Fund (PIF) of the Episcopal Church in Minnesota.

At the beginning of 2019, the Fund balance was \$211,350.91.

We took a draw of 5% (of the average balance over 5 years, which is recommended by the ECMN Trustees), for a total of \$10,469.92 over four quarterly draws.

We added \$60,000 to the fund, which are payments on the 2019 Capital Campaign Fund. We had gains in all quarters of \$23,154.92

The Fund ended the year with \$289,270.87. The difference between start and finish of the year is -\$77,919.96.

Stewardship:

Our Stewardship campaign this year was low-key, building on the *Power of Yes!* that came from your enthusiastic response to the Capital Campaign last spring. Here's the raw data:

For **2019** we received 116 pledges totaling \$317,833.

For **2020**, we have received 115 pledges totaling \$319,176.

11 Pledges were lost due to death, moves, or lack of response from the donor. Total \$11,646.

Budget:

Our 2020 Budget Reflects:

- \$28,921 from surplus funds saved over the last five years.

- Giving 2.5% raise to the staff

- Full year of Full-time Salary and Benefits for our Rector.

- Fully funding budget requests from Children, Youth and Music Ministries.

IF we would not use Surplus Funds, the budget would reflect a **Deficit** of \$28,921.

Balancing our budget without use of surplus funds needs to be a priority for our future.

We believe this budget created by the Finance Team and approved by the Vestry is fiscally responsible. The Finance Team and Vestry have chosen to spend only a portion of our surplus funds, allowing for some adjustment in future budgets, and a cushion in case of unexpected need.
