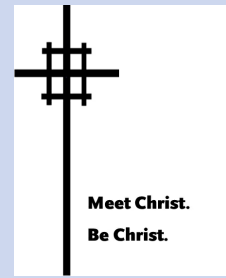

All Things New *by Fr. Randy+*

Kim mentioned in passing this past week, *"We are going to have a 'four-footer' staying with us overnight this weekend."* I said nothing in response, as it registered in my mind that we would be having one of our four-foot-tall grandkids staying over, as they have regularly done the past few years. On Friday evening, I recalled the earlier conversation and asked her which one of the kids would be coming. She said, *"Pepper, of course!"* Oh yeah, *"four-footer"* as in *"four paws!"* Pepper is a darling 3-year old Basset Hound grand-dog, being named for the freckling of dark spots on her muzzle and dazzling white paws.



It has been a delight to celebrate Pepper's curious nature as she explores and experiences God's creation in our neighborhood. She holds her nose close to the ground, dragging her enormous ears through the vegetation, and snorts the fragrant scents of this foreign place into her nostrils as if a canine vacuum cleaner. *A miraculous scent hound she is...*

She relishes frolicking with new human and canine neighbors, curiously staring down hopping orange-breasted robins, patiently sitting next to the wildlife pond gazing at the returning Sandhill cranes and Canada geese, and trying to figure out what the wild turkeys are clucking about in the adjacent woods. Absolutely everything Pepper is experiencing is done with a deep sense of awe, and wonderment, and joy, and delight. **All things are new**—spring is sprung, a new season is emerging, the old is set aside, and we are refreshed with the abundance of newfangled enchantments!

What Pepper is experiencing in her life is likewise mirroring great change in our own context. We are emerging from an extended time of difficult seasons—the impact of COVID, separation from one another, the trauma of war and conflict and strife in the world. God is recreating and reclaiming us in this season of great change. And the Holy Spirit is inviting us to join in the celebration of new life and boundless hope.

*“And the one who was seated on the throne said, “See, I am making **all things new.**” Also he said, “Write this, for these words are trustworthy and true.”* (Rev. 21:5) This is the promise we cling to in difficult times and circumstances. In the Eastertide following the Lenten season, we experience the joy of Christ's glorious resurrection as an Easter people—the promise of life everlasting is fulfilled for each one of us as followers of Jesus.

Now is the time to fully embrace the kingdom life right here and right now! I pray you will join me in delighting in this gift of life and communion with all creation, much as I have experienced once again through the eyes--*and nose!*--of our dear Miss Pepper. *“You have heard; now see **all this**; and will you not declare it? From this time forward I make you hear **new things**, hidden **things** that you have not known.”* (Isaiah 48:6) God's peace and joy be with you.

Music Notes

Before the Russians began shelling Ukrainian cities, I knew almost nothing about Ukraine. There's the Ukrainian Bell Carol (popularly known as the Carol of the Bells), but I couldn't have told you that it was written by Mykola Leontovych. And there are those beautiful Ukrainian Easter eggs.

During my one miserable year as the music teacher at a Catholic grade school, the best day was when the assistant principal set up her egg decorating equipment and made *pysanka* eggs with the kids. You can see a fascinating video if you search YouTube for "See the mesmerizing creation of a Ukrainian Easter egg." Additionally, a quick Google search will yield tons of beautiful photos of the elaborately colored eggs.

As we've learned from the overwhelming news reporting, the Ukrainian people are fiercely proud and patriotic and are becoming more so by the day. They've certainly won the hearts of most of the rest of the world, and I see makeshift Ukrainian flags almost everywhere I go these days. But when I am curious about a place, I like to explore it through their music and culture. And I quickly discovered that I had never heard of most of the Ukrainian composers. Perhaps the most famous of all would be Serge Prokofiev, who was born in Ukraine, but lived most of his life in, and is zealously claimed by Russia. I won't bore you with the other names I found, all of which actually sound pretty Russian and have an abundance of consonants, but I did look up a lot of their pieces and in a personal prayer for the people of Ukraine, have played several of them in church over this last month. Much of it is based on a folk tune and sounds quite Slavic to our Western ears. Many of the pieces begin with a somber melody in a minor key and transition to a more dance-like melody by way of a gradual acceleration of the tempo. This might remind you of any Russian folk dancing you might have seen. Or the Russian dancers in *Fiddler on the Roof*.

Choosing music to play for church rules out some styles – things that are too loud or *bravura* (Italian for show-offy), or too long. No one wants to sit through a 15 minute prelude, and no one *will* sit through a 15 minute postlude. So that leaves shorter pieces and interior movements of longer works which are more often in a slower tempo and more likely to be in a minor key. Music is based on a series of scales, and in Western music, most are either major or minor. Simplistically speaking, major keys sound pretty happy and minor keys sound a little sad. Lent is a good time of the church year for those sad-sounding pieces in minor keys. But I'll always remember being cautioned early in my career about not allowing Lent to become too dreary. And just last week, Rev. Marilyn reminded us that the eucharist is always a "little Easter." In an ordinary year, I think I thread that needle pretty well, but this year, I find myself gravitating more than usual toward the solemn and somber. While the lectionary readings always get darker and more bleak as we approach Holy Week, I think my melancholy is exacerbated by the times we're living through. So, if I've been a Debbie Downer for you on a Sunday lately, I do apologize. The good news is that there are only a few more weeks of Lent and Easter's a-comin'!

Pulse of the Parish

Vestry meeting held on March 21, 2022

This brief report is to inform you about the work and actions from the March 21st Vestry meeting.

Fr. Randy opened our meeting with the Leadership Prayer, followed by Madisen Crow's Vestry Covenant reading.

We saluted retiring Clerk Allison Jensen for her service as she ceremonially passed the keyboard over to our new Clerk, Robert Williams.

Finance Team member Tom Linder gave an in-depth overview of our faith family financial reports, sharing that overall we're looking very good financially as we start the second quarter of the year. Pat Ahern, liaison to Finance, reported that Xcel has paid us a total of twenty-six thousand dollars. The Finance team recommended to Vestry that the twenty thousand, for the easement purchase, to go to the Pooled Investment Fund. The six thousand, for use of parking lot, will go to the parking lot maintenance fund.

Jr. Warden Karen Hartman informed the Vestry members what teams they would be serving as liaisons to for the year. They will reach out to team chairs to let them know of their relationship.

In Unfinished business, Ann DePaolis Jones led the Vestry in a review and update of the Vestry Covenant. She also led a discussion on how we might better use our Parish Hall floor labyrinth. For starters, Fr. Randy shared that Rev. Marilyn Baldwin will be conducting a labyrinth instructional along with Holy Saturday morning services.

In Other business, Jr. Warden Karen Hartman reported that she and Cheryl Bailey discussed ideas, and also requested ideas from Vestry, for our top priority of reconnecting and reengaging our faith family members for the greater health and welfare of our community. This is being done in earnest as the pandemic subsides and we return to some normalcy in the coming months.

Under New Business, Library Team chair Allison Jensen shared that a historical hymn book was donated to the library and asked that the Vestry consider donating it to the U of M Archives where it would be put to good research use.

Other new business, with the focus on reconnecting with our faith family first and foremost, the Vestry decided it was best to pass on participating in the Roseville Rosefest parade this year, and left the door open for exploring other

opportunities for the 2023 Rosefest.

In the Rector Report, Fr. Randy mentioned hosting the Rev. Ted Neuhaus funeral with Bishop Loya presiding on March 24. We are re-evaluating our policy for our coffee gatherings, and are waiting for an update from ECMN on COVID guidelines. We briefly discussed the option of using a mask or not, and leaving it up to whatever each faith family member would be comfortable with. In addition, we discussed the possible purchase of HEPA air filters to be placed in various well used spaces in our facility.

Shout Outs to Bruce Warkentien and Steph Mann for helping us shred a dozen boxes of old parish dozen boxes of old parish documents. Calvary Episcopal Church (Rochester) and Janet McNally - For their donations of household furnishing and monetary donation for our future resettlement family.

The meeting ended with Eric Hedican leading us in Compline.
