Do Not Be Alarmed by Fr. Randy+

This past week I was fortunate to escape the downtown office and all of the spinning activity that has been consuming my mind (and sometimes even my soul) during the current legislative session. Our elected officials are working hard to do the work they are charged with in governing our state. That being said, there are many demands and needs to address in order for the legislative process to move forward.

My escape plan was to leave very early on last Thursday to drive to far western Minnesota, to help several school districts and their public safety partners develop school reunification plans and actually exercise those plans later this year. It an important task that is critical to the safety and security of students, staff, and their greater communities. Our overarching watchword to the groups as they advance their planning and training is, "**Do not be alarmed**—Be prepared, not scared."

As I drove westbound from I-94 into the rolling hills of the Glacial Lakes Area of our state, I began thinking about this Holy Week—all of the planning and preparing the multitude of details necessary to present meaningful worship experiences for the faithful of St. Christopher's. I drove along the shoreline of Lake Minnewaska near Glenwood, and the roadway straightened and stretched towards the horizon—traversing the richly endowed agricultural flatlands.



And, the snow began falling and blowing and swirling—quickly covering the fields and tree-lined twisting/turning river valleys with a stunningly white shroud. I knew what to expect next—the highway would become slick and slippery and likely dangerous to move ahead. I mentally prepared for what I would likely experience the remainder of my travels.

But, then my eyes were drawn to something totally unexpected—something that was a complete shock—something which I was completely unprepared for! I looked towards a grove of trees lining the Pomme de Terre River—and saw the bare-branched trees filled with dozens and dozens of perched American Bald Eagles. The eagles were perfectly still—standing watch over the countryside as it became blanketed with pristine white snow. It was a jaw-dropping sight and nothing like I had ever witnessed before in my life.



I then remembered the Mark 16 story of the women arriving at Jesus' tomb, and reflected this story alongside the experience of nature I had just witnessed —the brilliantly white snowfall on the fields like the shroud enveloping Jesus' body in the tomb; the trees filled with Bald Eagles like an angelic host dutifully standing watch over the land soon coming to new life, much as the young man/angel standing watch in the tomb which Jesus had been laid.

I could not help but ponder this unbelievable scene, and to see a reflection of the moment in the gospel of Mark's story (Mark 16) of the women going to Jesus' tomb following his crucifixion. Remember, Mary Magdalene and Mary the mother of James and Salome brought spices to the tomb to anoint Jesus' body, But when they arrived, they discovered the stone blocking the entrance to the tomb was already rolled away. As they entered, they saw a young man dressed in a dazzling white robe sitting in the tomb. They were alarmed, but he said to them, "Do not be alarmed; you are looking for Jesus of Nazareth, who was crucified. He has been raised; he is not here. Look, there is the place where they laid him."

The women WERE alarmed—not by what they had prepared for and what they had assumed they would find—a dead Jesus. They were not necessarily afraid of what they believed they would face—death. They had seen death. They had lived with death, and they knew what to do, what was expected of them, how to behave. Death, it seems, is simply part of living.

What frightened them was something they had *never* anticipated—Jesus was *not* there—*he was ALIVE!* What shocked them was *life*, and the possibility of life. And it terrified them; it was life that made them speechless and made them flee from the tomb—for they were afraid.

"Do Not Be Alarmed." Living into the risen life of Jesus can be shocking, terrifying, and alarming, because it manifests itself in Spirit-filled lives which are unpredictable, risky, and reverse to the way of the world. Life is so much easier when we know what to do, what is expected of us, how to behave. But a life empowered and emboldened by the Spirit of the Risen Jesus is unpredictable and risky, for that life is no longer ours, but Christ's who lives in us (Gal 2:20).

This is the life which will shock us back to our senses and rouse of from death. **Do Not Be Alarmed**. He is risen! The Lord has risen indeed! *Randy*+
