The group of people gathered around the table were quite familiar with each other. Some of them even looked much like each other—which was an accurate observation. As I scanned the room—the parish hall—I witnessed several other tables around the room which had a similar make-up. People were in extremely engaged conversations—laughing, crying, and hugging. Little kids were returning again and again to the desert table—grabbing all kinds of goodies, and most especially the M & M cookies—and counting the number of M & M's to decide which one was the very most special one! Small dinner rolls with ham and cheese, macaroni salad, pickles, bars, and of course, the requisite "funeral jello." You guessed it. I have spent the past week presiding at and attending funerals.

And, I suppose it is most appropriate I do so, since we have walked our way through Holy Week and the celebration of Christ's resurrection on Easter Day! *Alleluia! The Lord has risen indeed! Alleluia!*

Families and friends and neighbors--gathering and greeting. Sharing stories and memories, as well as catching up on all that has happened in their lives since they were last together. It may have been days or weeks, but more likely it has been years and years. Re-living the most memorable moments in their lives—the events which most shaped them and formed how they thought and grew and lived each and every day.

I sat and visited with my many cousins and uncle s and aunts at my uncle Jim Erickson's funeral in Alexandria. We shared many, many stories and recollections of "incidents" we were involved with as kids growing up together. It is a miracle that we all survived to adulthood—*Thanks be to God!* We reminisced about the times our parents and grandparents finally got us under control, and had us play board and card games—a time to just slow down the pace of our physical activity. We played card games like "*Authors,*" or "*PIT,*" or "*Rook.*" But we also played board games—most especially"Go To

The Head Of The Class." You may have played it, too. It was developed by the Milton-Bradley Company in 1936. The premise of the game was to advance through the classroom—*desk to desk*—to finally be at the head of the class. You did so by answering questions about a variety of academic subjects; language, science, art & music, math, history, literature, and geography. The things essential to understanding this world and this life.



The game is finished when one of the players reaches the final desk at the front of the class, and is given a diploma upon answering the final exam question.

I guess that at each of the funerals I have presided at, the person who has died and passed on into the resurrection life, has passed the final examination. They have reached the pinnacle of their life and have now earned their crown of glory with our Lord. And for that, we are eternally grateful.

But, what does that mean for the rest of us? Our conversation around the funeral luncheon table became focused upon this undeniable truth—we have all just moved up a desk in the classroom of life. We have just advanced another step towards our own goal of graduation—of claiming our own resurrection life in Jesus Christ, our Lord.

So—what do we do about it? What are we called to do as we take one more step forward in advancement in our earthly lives. *Well—this is my own thought about this...*

We are once again called to share our wisdom and honor and compassion and understanding with all those we encounter and engage in this life. Our life experience cannot be understated or duplicated. We are called to be fully present with those around us—to share practices and understandings with those with whom we live and love. This is essential and holy work. I pray that you take your desk, stake your position of authority and standing, and share the wisdom and life experience you have borne witness to, and enrich the lives of others who so dearly need your life presence. In Jesus Christ, our Lord.
