Happy 2017, St. Christopher's! As we enter the Season of Epiphany in our church calendar, I bid you the Peace from Steven Shakespeare's "Prayers For An Inclusive Church" -

*Jesus has broken down the dividing wall  
that made us strangers to one another;  
He has made us one humanity  
that God might be all in all;  
Jesus is our life, our hope, our peace.*

We are blessed with a long Epiphany-tide this year, stretching all the way through February, allowing us to hear readings in our lectionary cycle that generally go unheard. Epiphany is one of those flexible church seasons that expands and contracts depending on when Easter falls. Easter falls late in the calendar this year, so we have a protracted Epiphany: a longer time to reflect on this gift God has given us in Jesus being with us in human form.

For the January portion of the Epiphany Season, Sundays at St. Christopher's will include:

- Celebrating Epiphany this coming Sunday, the 9th, at both our 8:00 and 10:30 Eucharistic services.
- On Sunday the 15th we will begin exploring racism in Minnesota at our Adult Forum. This will be a continuing topic of discussion and exploration throughout Epiphany, Lent, and Easter. Our discussions will begin by using the book "A Good Time for the Truth: Race in Minnesota," as a starting point.
- The Annual Meeting will be the following Sunday, the 22nd, following our Together @ 9:30 Eucharistic Service. The Vestry will be hosting a light brunch to sustain us through the meeting.
- The next Sunday, the 29th, is a "5th" Sunday and Healing

Your Finance Team and Vestry continue their efforts to present a balanced and financially stable budget at the Annual Meeting. The results of the Stewardship Campaign were very encouraging, but our revenue from other sources has decreased, making the 2017 program budget not what had been requested. Based on additional pledges that have been secured, the budget sent out to the parish in early December has been slightly modified, restoring some cuts, but the reduction in employee hours have not been restored. Even given these facts, the truth remains that St. Christopher's is doing very well:

- with a strong missional heart continuing to lead us to be Jesus' hands in our neighborhood;
- with a pastoral sense helping us be empathetic to each other and our neighbors; and
- with a quiet confidence knowing that Jesus' love for us will help us through whatever challenges that will face us this coming year.

This Epiphany-tide:

"May Jesus, who draws the nations to himself, teach us to love our enemies; may Jesus, who enters the water of baptism, lead us to die to all but love; may Jesus, who gives new wine for the world, turn our sadness and worry into joy; and may God, the Holy Three in One, bless us and guide us always." (from S. Shakespeare: Prayers for an Inclusive Church)

## Food Shelf Update

I understand the feeling, because I have it as well. We, as a nation, weathered one of the most contentious and mean-spirited political seasons on record. It has ended with uncertainty and fear for some of our neighbors and for the world community as well. We faced, at the end of this year, daily photos of the absolute destruction of the city of Aleppo in Syria. Thousands of its citizens now homeless refugees as their government bombed their neighborhoods to rubble.

And then there was the revelation that Russia hacked computer systems in this country, in order to influence the outcome of that most contentious election. Resembling something that I am not sure even James Bond could cope with, their actions left us all feeling insecure. Our laptops, phones and other devices which have always been our trusted companions (we truly never leave home without them!) now had the reality of a more sinister connection. There has been talk, carelessly transmitted as tweets, that perhaps we should consider enlarging and enhancing our nuclear arsenal after decades of international efforts to do just the opposite, and there has been messaging that the United Nations is a worthless organization that meets to talk and have a good time. And the long-fought-for two-state solution to the Palestine-Israel situation that would bring peace to that most unpeaceful area of the world is now in serious jeopardy. All of which make the outgoing year and us as well a weary lot indeed.

It would, of course, be foolish to think that the incoming year, fresh faced in the cartoon and full of hope, would be all that we need to move beyond the troubles that 2016 brought. And it would be foolish to imagine that at the stroke of midnight all things would be well. And worse, it would be wrong to get so caught in the troubles of 2016 that we have no hope. Remember the words of John's Gospel: "the light came into the world and the darkness could not overcome it."

Now more than ever, we, as Christians, need to remember the gift that was given to us in that wonder-filled birth at Bethlehem. The gift of God incarnate, Emmanuel, God is with us. And we need, now more than ever, to remember that there is always something that we can and must do, no matter how hopeless we feel our circumstance is. Pray. Pray daily. Pray without ceasing. As we move into the next year, let us a faith community commit ourselves to daily prayer for the health and life of our world. It's easy; let me give you something to get us all started:

*O God, you made us in your own image and redeemed us through Jesus your Son: Look with compassion on the whole human family; take away the arrogance and hatred which infect our hearts; break down the walls that separate us; unite us in bonds of love; and work through our struggle and confusion to accomplish your purposes on earth; that, in your good time, all nations and races may serve you in harmony around your heavenly throne; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.*

On January 27th at 7pm, some of my favorite chamber musicians will join me in presenting a program of works by three composers who lived in Vienna and whose compositional lives were intertwined. First on the program, the Op. 11 Clarinet trio of Ludwig von Beethoven, written in 1797. Frequent St. Christopher's visitor, Rolf Krogstad and his son, Lars Krogstad Otiz will join me in a string trio version. Over the years, this piece by the young Beethoven has garnered the traditional nickname *Gassenhauer* or "street song" trio. The last movement is based on a melody from an opera by Joseph Wiegler, a prolific, but no longer remembered contemporary of the master composer. The little tune was all the rage in Vienna at the time, hummed and whistled by the folks in the streets, hence the nickname. Beethoven makes this little tune his very own by turning it into a set of variations - each variation a different twist on the same melody. Beethoven was a great improviser at the keyboard and completely mastered the variation form, writing more than twenty for solo piano and frequently using the form within other works as well.

Next we turn to the music of Franz Schubert, primarily known for his lovely art songs and his symphonies, the first of which was hailed as Beethoven's 10th. In the *Trockne Blumen* Variations for piano and flute, Schubert wrote these variations on his own melody from the song cycle *Die Schöne Mullerin* (The Miller's Fair Daughter) that he had written a few years before. *Trockne Blumen* (Withered Flowers) is a sad little song about flowers on the singer's grave and perhaps Schubert returned to it in, as he wrote to his brother Ferdinand in 1824, "a period of fateful recognition of a miserable reality". Poor Schubert was quite ill at the time and despondent and though he would only live another four years, he would "endeavor to beautify as far as possible" his miserable reality with an exceedingly prolific outpouring of beautiful music. Carol Gilkey, who teaches flute lessons in our choir room on Saturdays, will join me for this gorgeous set of variations.

Last, we take on the music of Johannes Brahms. The section leaders from St. Christopher's Choir will join me for a set of waltzes. Brahms was quite taken with a set of *Ländler*, little waltz-like folk dances that Franz Schubert had written for piano. Though it is not proven, it is sometimes posited that Brahms was inspired by his love for another composer's wife (Clara Schumann) to write his own waltzes, setting love poems from Georg Friedrich Daumer's *Polydora*. Originally written for mixed voices and piano four hands, the *Liebeslieder Walzer*, or "Love-song Waltzes" were immensely popular and proved quite a reliable revenue source. In the years that followed, Brahms arranged other settings of these popular waltzes as well as having composed a second set of them. We will use the composer's own setting of a piano solo

## **Pulse of the Parish - December 2015**

Good Morning. My name is Jan Fillmore, and I am on your Vestry. Today I am offering the Pulse of the Parish. The purpose of this brief update is to keep you informed of the actions taken by the Vestry at their meeting on Monday, December 19th.

- The monthly financial report was reviewed. Budgeted income is below expectations due to the kitchen not being used by renters. Our budgeted expenses for the month and year are below budgeted amounts. Our financial situation remains stable and as budgeted. As a reminder, we ask that if you have not yet started participating in the automatic withdrawal payment program, that you contact Ruth Thillen, our Parish Administrator, to begin participating in that program. It allows for more reliable cash flow.
- The Vestry learned that the LED light bulbs have arrived and are installed in the church space, and partially installed in the remainder of the building. That work should be completed in early January.
- The Vestry reviewed and approved slight modifications to the 2017 program budget based on new pledges received and as recommended by the Finance Team.
- The Vestry reviewed applications for and discussed the *Mardi Gras* fundraiser, awarding the fundraiser this year to the Youth, to assist in raising money for their summer mission trip.
- The Vestry reviewed plans for our **Annual Meeting**, which is scheduled for **Sunday, January 22nd** following the Together @ 9:30 service.
- The Vestry learned about a pilot program we will be testing for our Sunday Children's Education. The first Sunday of the month (starting in February), the children will have a "Chapel Education Experience," beginning at the start of the 10:30 service. The children will join the rest of the congregation on those Sundays at the Peace. For more information, or if you have any questions, please contact Marion Hunner, our Children's Ministries Director.
- The Vestry would like to recognize the following people in our "Shout-outs" for the work they have recently done for our parish:
  - Don Shiek for his continuing work installing the LED light bulbs.
  - Ruth Thillen for her continuing efforts in her administration work for the parish.
  - All involved in putting on this year's Service of Lessons and Carols.

Please be aware that the minutes of the December meeting will not be available to read online or in the library until after they have been approved at the Vestry's January meeting.
