

Acceptable Risk by Fr. Randy+

Earlier this week, Kim and I were walking our grand-dog, Rey, in the early twilight hours near our home, which is situated adjacent to a natural wetland. I began to hear Kim whoop and yelp, as we were besieged by an army of small frogs. These frogs were jumping and hopping and wildly flying through the air as they attempted to cross the road from the pond to the more woodsy side of our neighborhood. We tried our best to side-step them, but several succumbed to the "squished end of life" as passing vehicles did not see or avoid their excited hopping on the roadway. I know what you are thinking—the frogs did not have the mental capacity to understand or navigate the risk of hopping across a heavily traveled roadway. Got it. But they did engage unknowingly in very risky behavior and paid the ultimate cost for doing so.

In 1981, the newly forming electronic gaming industry introduced a game called "Frogger." I bet many of you remember it, or even played it. It was an animation game that had you, the player, navigate and guide a small frog—making it hop and skip between opposing traffic on a roadway and waterway. And yes, it was crammed full of dangerous hazards—speeding cars, enormous trucks, munching alligators and otters, and even bulldozers! You would have to use all of your skills and wisdom to safely hop that little frog from log to turtle back to highway median strip, in order to safely find your way to the security of the safe home at the top of the screen. It was a challenge—a challenge that became increasingly difficult as the animated world became more dark, more sinister, and moved more and more quickly.

Players spent hour upon hour learning the game through experience and through the teaching and wisdom of others. This preparation and learning of the process of living and surviving in this sometimes dangerous environment was critical to your success—your ability to sort danger from safety—to manage disaster and move it towards acceptable risk.

This whole "Frogger" game experience, and the experience of the small living frogs on my neighborhood walk, is really not that much different than what we experience in our lives—and not much different than experienced by the disciples and followers of Jesus during his time of ministry. Jesus spent much time and effort to teach his followers the way we should be living our life in faith and love. He taught through words and example—modeling how to be fully present and in support of others, especially those who have been distanced, marginalized, and persecuted. Jesus defined our purpose and mission in being his follower. It was much more than just having a primal drive to act and not understanding the purpose and process and way to live a life fully. The small neighborhood frogs acted on the primal drive alone—and many paid the ultimate price by acting on unacceptable risk.

A true leader prepares followers for the way ahead—even if it is full of danger. Jesus prepared his followers, both then and today, in learning, teaching, and living the way of love. And in doing so, we are prepared for the dangers and snares of this earthly life—and also know and understand the heavenly reward awaiting us on the other side.
