Practicing Silence

Most of us live in cities these days where silence does not seem to be a "natural" resource. We're talking constant communication by day and sirens by night. Not so, back in the day, on the farm. Yes, the muffled but throaty sound of the John Deere pulling 14's or 16's turning the earth, but turn off the tractor and it's birds singing or bees pollinating plants. Not exactly rock music.

Given our urban environment, it would seem that if silence were a value it would have to be intentionally practiced to be acquired. If we Episcopalians look closely at the way we typically worship on Sunday, we find encouragement to practice silence. After each reading of Scripture, there is the permissive rubric "Silence may follow" and in some congregations, there is a custom of holding a moment of silence to let the words of the Sermon "sink-in." All forms of The Prayers of the People have a rubric calling for or suggesting a response of silence. Following the invitation for Confession of Sin, again, "Silence may be kept." Although coming to the Table mainly involves the actions of offering, giving thanks, breaking and coming forward for communion, it is interesting to note that at the Breaking of the Bread "A period of silence is kept." Period.

In addition to the encouragement we are given to practice silence in liturgy, we in this northern clime are

blessed with dormancy in our winter landscape. I recall a brief conversation with an immigrant who moved to Minnesota from Somalia, arriving in winter. She was shocked by the lack of green things. She thought all the trees were dead! No, just dormant. Practicing silence for a season.

At best, silence puts her arms around us. She reminds each individual that they are there to be present to the moment. That they are bound to others and the earth by more than actions and words. Silence says, "Just this." Be here.

At times, we are called to or simply find ourselves in vigil. A need to be there where tragedy issues in unspeakable grief, or more pacifically, bedside at the death of a loved one. Assuring words need to be said but as with humor, timing is everything. Also, there needs to be room for "the sounds of silence."

If I'm right that in our day silence is not natural but still of value, we can thank the wisdom of the ages carved into the liturgy and spiritual practice of the church to help us practice silence. It's good to be ready. We never know when the Lord will appear in "a sound of sheer silence." (1 Kings 19:12)

Chrissy assumed food shelves were filled with dented cans and processed foods. So when Chrissy's friends encouraged her to visit a food shelf when her financial situation became strapped, she initially disregarded their advice.

Chrissy began reducing her monthly food budget after she received notice that her monthly rent was going up. To continue making ends meet, the first things that came off her shopping list were meats and fresh

In addition to these activities I have been busy making connections with other Roseville faith communities, primarily St. Michael's Lutheran and Roseville United Church of Christ, concerning ways in which we can reach out to and journey with our immigrant neighbors. Currently we are in conversation with a Spanish language Lutheran church, Cristo Rey, that is working on collecting basic need items for an immigrant community that worships with them. If you are interested in finding out more about this venture, please contact me.

We also have a small but loyal group that join a prayer vigil the second Tuesday morning of every month beginning at 7:30 in front of the BishopWhipple Federal Building. (Yes that is the same Whipple; I even gave a talk about him!) The vigil lasts about 45 minutes and I promise it will get warmer! Again I am there every month; let me know if that is something you might be interested in. We also take small (two to four folks) group to witness immigration court on Tuesday and Thursday mornings.

I have also been in contact with a group of Ethiopian refugees from the Anuak tribe, to start a conversation circle around coffee and handiwork. These are women who wish to share their stories and their culture, and very much would love for us to help them practice their English. We will meet the third Saturday afternoon of every month in the parish hall from 1 to 4 pm, starting on March 17th. And I am also in contact with a woman whose organization trains folks to help our immigrant neighbors correctly fill out the paper work necessary to move them forward towards citizenship. If any of these activities interest you please contact me, I would love to hear from you!

I was heartened to see that we, as a faith community, are on the path outside our doors to discover where God has been at work in the neighborhood ahead of us, and once discovered to join in that work for the life of the world. And realizing that one path does not fit or interest all, with the help of my friends who are Do Good, Roseville, I have been busy finding many paths for us to try out. Let me know what path or paths may speak to you and I will help you with those first steps!


