

Northside Snow

April 23, 2018

Driving along the highway on my way home from St. Christopher's yesterday, I took notice of the late Spring phenomenon of melting snow. What a contrast this Sunday was from just a week ago when a late winter storm clogged driveways and roads with 15 inches of snow, severely affecting attendance at worship. But this Sunday was glorious-bright sun and the temperature rising into the 60's!

Back to the melting snow. Along the highways, hillsides and north sides of buildings, the last vestiges of winter were hanging on. It's about temperature and the angle of the sun. I wonder about that snow. Is it eager to be gone, signaling transformation to a new season of growth? Or is it holding on, not wanting to change and move forward?

It's natural to have ambivalence about change. Some changes strike us as good; some not so much. If we suffer from addiction, it's good to get help, but that help also involves getting a new kind of life-surely a challenge for all concerned. It can take time to discover what changes auger for increased health and vitality and which ones takes us in the opposite direction.

certainly the most notable one to those outside our doors, the contribution of their efforts has been a gift not only to us, their faith community, but to the community at large. Those nifty, presorted recycle bins in the parish hall were obtained through a grant, and make sorting out our recycling even that much easier. We have all new energy efficient lighting throughout the church that helps us to lower electric bills, but also spare the environment as well. The Giving Garden also comes under their care as we plant vegetables to harvest for the Keystone Food Shelf, as well as planting monarch and bee friendly plants in and around the vegetables to help those smallest of endangered species. The Green Team's presence at St. Christopher's has not only made our lives richer but has been of benefit our neighbors as well.

The truth is, when the earth suffers from our failures to tend to her well being, it is the poorest of our neighbors who bear the greatest share of the result. Severe drought in sections of this world have made it impossible for the poorest of our sisters and brothers to provide the most basic of human needs, water. Not only water to sustain human life, but water necessary for growing food. When the temperature of the world's oceans and seas rises but even just a few degrees, the results can and have produced catastrophic storms that cross landscapes without regard to damage they cause and the people they displace. (Parts of Puerto Rico are still without power and easy access to fresh water from Hurricane Maria.) It is the people who suffer through the storms that have least who are affected the most. We are reminded more than once by Jesus that we are to care for the poor, for the least, the last, and lost among us, and when we take what may seem as even the smallest of steps to care for the earth, we do just that.

I am grateful for the efforts of our Green Team. They have, through their care and concern for this "planet earth our island home," reminded me time and again that to care for least of these we care for Christ, to tend to the earth is to tend to our neighbors. It is (finally) spring! Time to plant, to tend and continue to conserve one of the greatest gifts God has entrusted to us, the earth. The good news is that even the smallest of efforts on our part combined can make the greatest of difference.



I hope you have enjoyed the May **e-Traveler**.


