Taking the Next Step

As I understand St. Christopher's when it comes to money, the parish is fairly conservative; that is, you are careful and have a keen interest in being responsible—a disposition surely “natural” for a church! You tend to prefer to “pay as you go” and not go out on a limb. Lay people here are very involved in keeping expenses down as, for example, in shoveling snow off of sidewalks in winter and doing janitorial work to supplement the cleaning service all year around. The parish has an effective and active Finance Committee that reports to the Vestry on a monthly basis. When it comes to the Annual Budget and Stewardship Campaign, the orientation tends to be rather pragmatic: ask for pledges, see the result, construct the budget on what is known and make sure it balances.

This year, things are a little different because our circumstances are different: we are in transition and we are doing the work of calling a new rector. So far, the process of securing a new spiritual leader seems to be going quite well—the Discovery and Discernment Team has turned over its work to the Search Team which is now meeting regularly. Soon work on the website will be finished and the materials that include a “package” for a rector will be launched. At its August meeting, the vestry, on the recommendation of the Finance Committee, took two important actions: 1) to instruct the Search Team to seek a full-time rector and 2) to combine the Annual Stewardship Campaign with a Capital Campaign.

Parishioners will remember the meeting we had on July 29th to discuss our finances relative to the calling of a rector. Because the anticipated expenses for a full-time rector calls for increased pledging by parish members, it has been of obvious import for church leaders to have a sense of the parish in going forward. The positive response received in conversations and the need to take action in order to move the process forward led to the vestry's action concerning the rector.

Now vestry action about the Capital Campaign is another story and indeed as wonderful one! For this story, please read the following article. Indeed, it is an exciting moment here at St. Christopher's and I am pleased to be a part of it. dvp

Fall Stewardship and Capital Campaign Update

The Stewardship Committee is busy with preparations for the Fall Stewardship Campaign, which will run from October 14 through early November, with In-gathering Sunday on November 11. The Campaign will reflect the high level of energy expressed by members this summer for a successful campaign to set us up for our future. We have clearly heard the will of the parish to call a full time rector and we are heartened by the high level of commitment for a successful fall campaign to raise the pledges this will require.

We are also very excited to announce that we are starting the preparatory stages for a Capital Campaign, to begin this fall! This three-year campaign will build on the currently ongoing campaign to erase the sewer repair debt, and the newly expanded campaign will also aim to eliminate the solar panel loan. We have received an extremely generous lead gift to kick off this next stage of the campaign. We are highly excited about a successful campaign, which will be a wonderful step toward securing the financial security of the parish. Look for more information in the weeks to come!

The Deacon Discusses

Like most of you, I am subject to a number of things that arrive in my inbox on a regular schedule. Some come uninvited and others I have asked for their appearances. Earlier this week, I found an interesting article from the Episcopal News Service (one of the arrivals that I request) on a 30 Day Evangelism Challenge. 30 days of thought provoking/conversation-worthy posts appear as the basis of this endeavor. The 30 days are divided into three sub groups, centered on the following: Days 1-10: Looking In, Days 11-20: Looking Around and Days 21-30: Looking Out. So, for example, day one requires the participant to "Think about the last 24 hours. What has given you joy? Name it and give thanks." Moving to the second sub group, the post for day 14 invites us to "Make a plan to attend a community meeting. Tell someone you plan to attend. Go and listen." A challenge from the final 10 days includes, on day 24, to "Take time to pray for the people in your neighborhood."

I must admit I was intrigued. “The reason it’s 30 days is it takes 30 days to change a habit,” said the Rev. Becky Zartman, one of the creators of the challenge. Together with Patricia Lyons, she created the game-like exercise. What I found most refreshing was that this was Episcopal-style evangelism that called us, as members of a faith community, into a new way of being, in our own lives and in the lives of those who move just beyond our doors. There is much emphasis on being, on listening and on loving our neighbors. What it doesn’t pattern is what we (as Episcopalians) typically think of as Evangelism. You know, the word we refer to as the “E word,” the thing that we just sort of really don’t, well, what I am trying to say is “that just really isn’t us” word. The emphasis is not on bringing folks into our church, but rather on us going into the world to live out our promise to “Meet Christ, Be Christ.” Perhaps the strongest piece of this imitative is that, according to the Episcopal News Service, “The new habit formed by challenge participants is the practice of evangelism. The game-like series of daily prompts encourages reflection and action, harnessing the recent energy in the Episcopal Church around evangelism and seizing on the spirit of experimentation encouraged by Presiding Bishop Michael Curry’s *Way of Love* and its seven rule-of-life practices.”

The only thing that I found frustrating was that the news feed landed in my inbox on this last Tuesday, and they were already at day 27 of the challenge; and since this was an experiment or trial run, there does not seem to be readily accessible way to start at the beginning. Still I keep thinking that an evangelism challenge such as this could be just what the Spirit is calling us as St. Christopher’s into at this point on our journey. Anyone interested in helping figure out a way to make this happen for those interested? Just let me know!!

As we begin to look toward fall and coming back together again after our vacations and sojourns to the lake, I want to invite you to join us at **Flat Earth Brewing on Sunday, September 9th from 4-7pm**. Flat Earth is at 688 Minnehaha Ave East in St. Paul, in the old Hamm’s building. They are kid and dog-friendly, they have games and their own root beer and ginger ale. They have great parking and lots of space.

These spontaneous brewery gatherings are a result of wanting to foster “fun and fellowship” without anyone being burdened with set-up, clean-up and all day cooking. Since this is technically the Music Notes column, I suppose I should say something musical. I'm presently up to my ears in choosing music and making plans for the year. And feeling very French. My dad wasn't musical at all – he sat in church with the hymnal, but it was resting on his knee. He never sang a note. Except a couple of “play party” tunes from his childhood in Texas and Arizona. But he had a fairly interesting LP collection for the time – Bach & Beethoven, Herb Alpert & Al Hirt, every Broadway musical soundtrack you'd want and the Singing Nun. So a whole hour of French carols will be a sampler of tunes with differing styles and temperaments. And if that isn't enough for you, come back in January for an all-French recital programme. Carol Gilkey is joining me for the Poulenc Flute Sonata, my son Henry is joining me for Poulenc's musical telling of Babar, the little elephant. And we're busy rounding up flute players for a transcription of the *Cantique de Jean Racine* by Fauré. I'm thinking maybe madeleines and éclairs for the reception, too. *Mais, oui!*

FOCUS OF THE YEAR

This year will focus on the enormous contribution that First Nations people have made to our identity as Episcopalians in Minnesota. And, in honoring this, seek to better understand how we can seek reconciliation for past conflict between First Nations and European people.
