Communion: Any guest who desires to receive Holy Communion may do so.

Baptism: The Sacrament of Baptism is normally only administered to infants, children, and adults who themselves (or whose parents) intend to become active participants in this local congregation. Times for Baptism are: Easter Eve, Pentecost, St. Christopher's Feast, All Saints, and the first Sunday of Epiphany. Baptisms can be arranged for other Sundays by conversation with the Rector.

Burial: The liturgical service of the "burial of the dead" is available to members of any Christian denomination.

Marriage: The Sacrament of Christian Marriage must be arranged at least 90 days prior to the date, and requires at least three counseling sessions.

Membership: Those desiring to become communicant members of St. Christopher's should consult with the rector. An Inquirer's class is held as needed.

Minutes of the 2014 Annual Meeting Sunday, January 18, 2015

The Annual Meeting was called to order at 12:00 noon. Fr. John led everyone in reading the Prayer for the Annual Parish Meeting.

Election of a Clerk: a motion to approve Laurie Toensing as clerk of the meeting was made, seconded. The motion was passed by acclamation.

<u>Vincent Anderson Awards</u> were given out to Darlene Cross, Karen Hanna, Laurie Toensing, Cynthia Verhey and Bruce Warkentien.

<u>St. Christopher's Award</u> was awarded to Don and Julie Shiek.

Acknowledgement of Vestry and Staff: Fr. John and Don Shiek thanked the Wardens, the retiring Vestry members, the returning members and the clerk for all of their service. Fr. John also acknowledged all staff members and thanked them for their hard work.

Approve Minutes of 2014 Meeting: A motion to accept the Minutes was made by Mary Pendergrass, seconded by Harold Danley. Motion was approved by acclamation.

Elections of Wardens and Vestry: No nominations were made from the floor. A motion was made and seconded to accept Jean Crow as Sr. Warden and Mary Pendergrass as Jr. Warden. The motion was approved by acclamation. A motion was made and seconded to accept three new Vestry members (no nominations were made from the floor) - Darlene Cross, Elizabeth Grayden, and Barbara Swanson. The motion was approved by acclamation.

2014 Financial Report and 2015 Budget were presented by Barb Herrmann for the Finance Committee. An end of year deficit was primarily the result of paying for building security longer than expected, and by rent from the Dellwood property coming in later than expected. The budget was balanced using funds from Dedicated Accounts, our only source at this time.

Dramatic cuts had to be made to the 2015 final budget; pledges made fell below the requested amount. There are only two full-time staff members and nothing to draw from in dedicated accounts, leaving few places to make cuts. The Sexton position was cut. The parish will need to step up to help with building cleaning and maintenance, and with making reminder call to those who may have fallen behind with pledges. The 2015 Budget will be reviewed and adjusted, if necessary, every quarter by the finance committee. Comments and questions were taken from the floor.

<u>Senior Warden's Report</u>: Don Shiek started by first acknowledging the hardworking kitchen team for the day's excellent lunch. Don thanked the vestry for all their hard work this past year, and thanked the parish for making St. Christopher's the great place that it is. Don noted the wonderful family we all have here as expressed primarily in worship and our children's and youth programs.

Junior Warden's Report: Jean Crow thanked Don Shiek for his dedication to St. Christopher's and also expressed her gratitude for all the building upgrades made, and her pride in the community dinners we've been offering.

Rector's Report: Father John expressed his love for the parish and thanks that he is here with us. (See the 2014 Annual Report for many good things he listed.) Highlights included; establishing a grant fund for Mission Opportunities, a procedure to access those funds, and the fund reaching \$10,000 in its first year; solar panel implementation; garden repair and expansion; and living into our commitment to live within our Budget.

There was no other business from the floor, the meeting was adjourned at 1:00 pm.

Rector's Annual Report—2015 Reported on 1/24/16

I am blessed to inform all of you that the state of our parish is very strong: both spiritually and financially. We began 2015 with a very tight budget putting us in the difficult position of eliminating a staff position (the sexton), and the creation of the Order of Mop and Dusters. Even though the budget was tight, I am pleased to report that we ended the year with a surplus over \$11,000. This is in part due to the staff being very cautious and conscientious about individual budget lines, but also because we received 100% of our pledges.... meaning the surplus is also due to the faithful stewardship of the members of this faith community.

We have accomplished many things in 2015, and have continued our efforts in being a known member of the community here in Roseville. Some highlights of the year are:

- The courtyard project the painting, planting and installation of new windows was completed.
- The parking lot was repaired, repaved, and resealed, making for a safer and more pleasant arrival and departure.
- The solar panels were installed. And although at the writing of this report the connection issue with X-cel Energy is unresolved, this project remains something about which we should be very excited and proud.
- We hosted a state-wide fundraiser for Episcopal Relief and Development that, with the matching grant, raised over \$20,000 for ERD. St. Christopher's was recognized at The Episcopal Church's General Convention in Salt Lake City, Utah because of this achievement.
- The Giving Garden was moved and expanded, under the planning and guidance of parishioner Austin Trapnell and his Eagle Scout project.
- We have increased areas in the building that have air conditioning (the kitchen,

- the classrooms), making these spaces more marketable for leasing.
- We made the final payment on the \$220,000 loan we gave to ourselves two and a half years ago.
- We were able to hire a cleaning company that cleans our bathrooms and professionally mops our church, parish hall, and kitchen floors.
- Our monthly Community Dinner program continues to grow and is making a true difference in people's lives.
- We began, on the months where there is a fifth Sunday, to incorporate a healing component into that Sunday's Eucharist celebration.
- We had a very successful Silent Auction fundraiser that increased our Mission Opportunity Fund by over \$7,000.
- We instituted a new Summer Service Schedule that, after a parish-wide survey, proved to be overwhelmingly popular (and will return again this coming summer).
- We have continued to live into our commitment to only have fundraising events for our Mission Opportunity efforts and not ask for any moneys for our program budget outside that which is pledged.
- We had a successful Stewardship Campaign, making the budget presented in this Annual Report one about which we can all be proud.

I am so very blessed to serve as your rector, and I am excited for what the Spirit has in store for all of us in 2016.

My prayers remain always about you.

Deacon's Report

It always seems hard to believe that we have reached the time for the Annual Meeting. Our lives here at Sr. Christopher's are full and busy and to quote a familiar adage time does fly when you are having fun! And so here we are once again at the wonderful place of looking back and forward.

Our Community Dinner, which is held on the last Thursday of each month with one exception, has continued to grow. Last month's dinner which was held on New Year's Eve was one of the best attended to date and thanks to Allison Jensen who had a well written and timed article in the "Roseville Review," we saw several new faces join us. Our Thanksgiving dinner, which is the one Thursday exception, and our New Year's Eve offering made the point that all are welcome to our tables. Those in need of a good meal, those looking for good dinner conversation and those seeking a welcoming community are all welcome to our table. Need is not always qualified by income and our doors are open to anyone who might enjoy a meal out and good company. We always welcome new volunteers as well, whether you want to be a part of the kitchen crew under the able direction of The Rev. Vant Washington, are interested in getting to know our guests by joining them at the table or are great at running the dishwasher. Contact us and we will find you a place!

Our Green Team has been very busy with some rather large projects, most notably our Solar Panels which now distinguish us to all who travel along Highway 36. They have also acquired through a grant the large new receptacles that contain bins for both waste and recycled materials. They are large and handsome and a welcome addition indeed. In conversation with a fellow deacon a few weeks back we started talking about community gardens and he said he was having trouble getting Vestry approval for a garden at his faith community. They feared how it would look. I told him he needed to find an Eagle Scout and told him about the fantastic garden that was built under the direction of Austin Trapnell. I am eagerly looking forward to watching it grow and

supply vegetables to the Keystone Food Shelf, as well as provide plants that are good for bees and butterflies. Well done Austin and well done Giving Garden folks who are a part of the Green Team.

The ECMN Mission Opportunity 2015 was Haiti and after much thought and research we decided to raise monies for Project REACH (Rural Entrepreneurial and Agricultural Cooperative for Haiti) run by Project Heifer. We raised a little over \$2,000.00 for the purchase of goats and chickens during our campaign. This year we look toward the environment.

These were the major and growing mission opportunities that we engaged in this year, and we have many longtime and ongoing mission activities that continue to do work outside the doors of St. Christopher's as well, yet we know that Holy Spirit is always calling us into new and different relationships with our neighbors. To help us with that very important Holy Listening our deacon intern Diane Elliot has helped us to begin an Intentional Prayer Group that meets on the second and fourth Sundays between services. This has been a wonderful and faith filled experience where we have begun to hear the Holy Spirit in a new way. For example, as Super Bowl 2018 approaches our Justice Seekers will walk with those who work to prevent the crime of sex trafficking of young girls. And in doing so will learn how we can help the effort to prevent this crime from happening. And the Justice Seekers as well as some of our faith community have heard the Spirit lead us into conversation, learning and relationship with our Muslim neighbors. We will begin a program every other Sunday morning between services and led by Diane during Lent and continuing on into Eastertide on February 14th with the viewing of the National Geographic short film entitled "Jerusalem." Please join us as we seek to conquer fear with knowledge and understanding.

As I said at the beginning this has been a busy and full year and time indeed has sped by quickly. I suspect that 2016 will be just as full and move by just as quickly which indeed something to which I am looking forward. I give thanks always that I have been called to be your

deacon and have the privilege of walking alongside you as together we journey into the world to engage in God's mission!

Music Ministries

From earliest times, music has been an important element of Christian worship. And every Episcopal church, no matter how small, will tell you that music is important to them and their choir is "the best." Well, some of that is probably ripe for interpretation, but all the hearts are in the right place. At St. Christopher's, we try to offer ways for musicians of all ages to make music and share their gifts with the congregation. Our 10:30 worship service is enlivened by the musical offerings prepared by our Parish Choir, our Handbell Choir and our groups for children and youth - the Archangels and the Company of Heaven. Most of them meet weekly throughout the program year and work faithfully and diligently. In 2015, they have all grown more accomplished in their musical expression, nurtured one another on the journey and shared in the laughter and fellowship that naturally develops when a group works so closely together. I am greatly blessed by the opportunity to make music with all of these lovely people each week.

Our Parish Choir rehearses and prepares music faithfully from September to Pentecost. We've added a few new members this year and have conquered some more complicated pieces with the help of our section leaders. In addition to our weekly duties, we presented an evensong and tea last fall, as well as our annual Lessons and Carols service at Christmastime.

Our Handbell Choir has added some new members as well and we have a lot of fun together up in the balcony where no one can see us. We regularly challenge ourselves with new music and new bell techniques. And this year, we are trading blocks of time with the Company of Heaven, so we only have four or five weeks to learn a few pieces and play them. Then we get that much time off while the middle schoolers rehearse in the Wednesday night time slot. It's not optimal, but I do think it's working pretty well.

Our Archangels and the Company of Heaven continue to charm us with their musical gifts and confident performances. Both groups are smaller this year, which poses some challenges, but we are choosing music carefully and creatively and having a great time learning it as well.

The Music Ministry simply wouldn't function as we do without the help of so many. Of course, we offer our gratitude to all the musicians, who make the commitment to learn the music and attend rehearsals and services regularly. Karen Hanna is the Parish Choir "Mum", who keeps me in line and keeps everyone else in music and folders and pencils and robes and cough drops and you name it. She's the best. Marion Hunner, our Director of Children's Ministries and superb kid-wrangler keeps the Archangels and me organized and marching in time. Also thanks to the Archangel and Company of Heaven parents and the ladies of the Parish Choir, especially Darlene Cross, who with Karen Hanna are always up for a musical or aesthetical, or even an engineering challenge. A special thanks, too, to AJ Lund, who has been our fabulous bass section leader and soul and blues man almost as long as I've been here; Katherine Johnson, who has been our alto section leader for several years, and has charmed us as much with her ready laughter as her lovely voice; Tom McNellis, who is a welcome new addition to the tenor section this year; and Geneva Cole, our choral intern in the soprano section, who has finished at the U of M and will be off on new adventures next year. These young people provide musical expertise and affability in equal measure and the choir and I are so very grateful for their faithful service. My deepest thanks to Fr. John, Deacon Janet and the wardens and vestry for their abiding support of our music ministry. And many thanks to St. Christopher's parish for your support as well, and your appreciation of our efforts.

Children's Ministries

The children and families were very busy during 2015! We began the year with our 3rd annual dramatic sermon, "Moses and the Freedom Fanatics," which we were able to reprise when we went to Episcopal Church Homes in February. The visit to the church home is part of our annual tradition of Pizza, Singing and Bowling an opportunity for the children to reach out to the church home community while also building community amongst themselves. The Archangels Choir participated in the Lent 1 liturgy as well as Easter and Recognition Sunday. Then we switched gears for summer - taking a break from Sunday School, but enjoying a funfilled week of VBS, "Everest: Conquering Challenges with God's Mighty Power." After our summer hiatus, we dove into the new program year with the Hayride and Young Life Sabbath in October. Sunday School took on a new look when we combined all of the children, age 4-10, into one classroom to explore the Liturgy of the Holy Eucharist from September through Advent. The Archangels Choir made their debut for Lessons and Carols, accompanied by the Company of Heaven youth choir on Orff instruments, and the children's artwork adorned the bulletins from Christmas Eve through Epiphany.

As we begin a new year, the children are working on their next dramatic sermon, which will tell the story of Creation. We look forward to putting away our Alleluias in February, and we hope to return to the church home in March. VBS is on the horizon, with dates and the theme to be announced in February.

While our numbers are small, we have a strong group of committed families. All of our regular families are actively involved in the children's programs, and I am very grateful to the volunteers that keep our Sunday School program running smoothly: Kathy Ackerman, Jean Darnell, Carol Duff, Joe Fear, Craig Hunner, and Chris Huntley.

Nursery

We began 2015 offering nursery care during adult education/choir practice as well as the 10:30 liturgy. At that time we had a paid nursery attendant, and we rotated volunteers to keep two adults in the nursery at all times. The volunteers were scheduled about once every 8 weeks.

When our nursery attendant left in May, we did not replace her. Based on the low attendance in the nursery and the fact that it was not being utilized at all during education hour, we decided that it was not cost effective to hire someone for this positon. Over the summer our volunteers doubled up to cover the 9:30 service. We are now doing the same thing to provide nursery care during the 10:30 service. With this schedule, team members commit to about one Sunday per month. It would be great to have more volunteers helping to provide quiet, focused worship time for the parents of small children.

Youth Ministries

Youth Ministry, as long as I can remember, has been structured so that youth gather for Wednesday night conversations, prayer is sometimes infused into that time, and deeper justice experiences were reserved for summer mission trips. These deep justice experiences were oftentimes void of any relational context, which in itself brings the idea of "deep justice" into question. In better understanding our own giftedness and identity as members of St. Christopher's, we have been inspired to turn this traditional model of youth ministry on its head. While we have always remained focused on personal growth and the development of strong bonds within our group (through bonfires, pizza, trivia nights, etc.), we have become more committed to serve as partners in the other communities to which we belong -- those

ministries within our church building and those beyond the walls of our building.

During the fall and early winter, we have focused on creating relationships with other ministries within our church. We assisted in the Community Thanksgiving Dinner, designed a cornucopia model to support our Gifts of Hope initiative, and developed a way to prayerfully support those among us who attended our Blue Christmas service. We also reached out to build relationships with other Episcopalian youth through participation in Teens Encounter Christ (TEC), and remain in strong relationship with this community.

These experiences have shaped how we envision ourselves in the future. For instance, we are in conversation about moving youth group from Wednesday to Thursday night on the last week of each month so that we can participate in the Community Dinner. We look forward to constructing a new box to hold the "Alleluias" and to prayerfully and creatively designing art for the bulletin covers during Lent. We also look forward to becoming more active in the greater community through participating in a service learning weekend in March, and also by serving as a positive voice in relationship building between Christian and Muslim members of our community. Youth have willingly accepted a call to seek out a deeper understanding of discipleship and an expanding presence in our quest for justice in the Twin Cities.

Much effort has been put into the creation of meaningful spaces and experiences for our youth. Trips like Banff and the Boundary Waters have been invaluable opportunities to strip away the comforts of home and truly learn the gift of being truly present to other people. This has resulted in the formation of strong bonds between those who participate. I would like to see these expanded summer opportunities continue, with the possibility of a larger European pilgrimage during the summer of 2017.

I am very happy with the growth and prayerful transformations I have witnessed over the past year. I believe that we are leaning into a model of youth ministry that truly honors the tenets of the missional church movement, a philosophy the Episcopal Church in Minnesota firmly embraces, and in which St. Christopher's continues to demonstrate exceptional leadership.

Committee Reports

Green Team

Our mission is to advocate for and practice protection of the environment (our home), to preserve God's creation for future generations.

2015 has been a very busy year for the Green Team. We have had success in a number of different projects including.

- -Giving Garden: Over 30 parishioners under the direction of Austin Trapnell, designed and built the garden bed and fencing on the South side of the sanctuary. Take a look at the beautiful finished garden and solar panels above.
- Solar Array Completed: The solar array was completed on the south side of the sanctuary.
 We continue to work with Xcel for final link up to the electrical grid.
- -Earth Day: An Earth Day celebration service and presentation by Sundial Solar Company. Aric Sorenson and Mike Krause presented information on our solar panel project and information on solar gardens. Parishioners enjoyed healthy treats of yogurts, fresh fruits and gluten free baked items.
- Recycling Bins: A \$5000 grant was obtained for new recycling bins to be placed throughout the church.
- -Adopt a Highway: Green Team members and friends participated in a trash clean up around the church property and a quarter mile up and down Hamline Ave. Many garbage bags of trash were collected for pickup by the city.
- Christmas Light Recycling: Many bins of old Christmas lights were collected at St.
 Christopher's. These lights were recycled by adults with disabilities at local vocational centers.
- -e-Traveler Messages: Green Team members have contributed relevant green issues to the e-traveler on a monthly basis.
- Xcel Energy Lighting Audit: A room by room audit of lighting and energy use was completed. Lighting upgrades and rebates were identified. Project will be completed as

- funds become available.
- Cool Congregations Challenge: Our solar array project has been entered into Interfaith Power and Light green project competition. Top entry will win \$1000.

How did you come to be a parishioner at St. Christopher's and when?




How has St. Christopher's shaped your relationship with God and his community?
